We are pleased to announce that the first volume of our new book series "Women in the History of Philosophy and Sciences" has been published! The book on „Women Phenomenologists on Social Ontology: We-Experiences, Communal Life, and Joint Action“, edited by Sebastian Luft and Ruth Hagenruber, Paderborn University, has been published by Springer International Publishing.

“This edited volume examines women's voices in phenomenology, many of which had a formative impact on the movement but have been kept relatively silent for many years. It features papers that truly extend the canonical scope of phenomenological research. Readers will discover the rich philosophical output of such scholars as Edith Stein, Hedwig Conrad-Martius, and Gerda Walther. They will also come to see how the phenomenological movement allowed its female proponents to achieve a position in the academic world few women could enjoy at the time.” The next volume of the series is more specifically going to deal with Gerda Walther's Phenomenology of Sociality, Psychology, and Religion.
