2. Panel Discussion: Dieter Birnbacher – “Philosophinnen im Kanon?” (July 31, 2019)

Prof. Dr. Dr. h. c Dieter Birnbacher is a philosophy professor at the Heinrich-Heine-University Düsseldorf and a leading expert on ethics and practical philosophy in Germany. Moreover, he was one of the initiators for establishing Practical Philosophy/Ethics in the curriculum for schools in North Rhine-Westfalia. As part of the German section of the Summer School, we will organize a round of discussions on Wednesday, July 31, 2019. Dieter Birnbacher (Düsseldorf University), Ruth Hagenhuber (Paderborn University), Sarah Hutton (University of York, UK), and Maria Nühlen (Merseburg University of Applied Sciences) will discuss with the audience in what way women philosophers can and should be part of the syllabus.

Sabrina Ebbersmeyer (University Copenhagen) will chair the debate. The event begins at 6 p.m. and is open to all interested parties.
