


Journal of the History of Women Philosophers and Scientists (BRILL) Call for paper

Call for paper for the first thematic issue Vol I, 1:

Women Philosophers - Beyond Boundaries Full paper submission: June 30, 2022

The first issue is devoted to the pressing questions of the present, which goes hand in hand with the rediscovery of the history of women philosophers and scientists.

- Should these newly discovered texts be placed within the patriarchal context or do we need a new start?
- Do the texts of women philosophers fit seamlessly into the conventionalized patriarchal historiography or do they revolutionize our cultural intellectual habitudes?
- What role do women from history play regarding non-Western philosophy, colonialism and classism?
- How does the history of women philosophers contribute to promoting change in philosophy, politics, science?

Please submit your anonymized paper (7.500-10.000 words) for peer review to the editors-in-chief (email addresses below) no later than June 30, 2022. Publication date of Volume 1, Issue 1 is Spring 2023.

International Women's Rights Day

8th of March is International Women's Rights Day and the perfect opportunity to focus attention on impressive, but a little-known women. In 2022, more than ever, it is time to listen to these requests and not forget the women who fought for other women's rights and health (and to think of the Ukrainian women and men who are fighting for their freedom).

The Center for the History of Women Philosophers and Scientists tries to give a voice to all these intellectual women. During the summer semester, there are some lectures on women philosophers, for example, the lecture given by [Dr. Jil Muller](#), on [Émilie du Châtelet](#) and Descartes.

In Italy, the right for women to vote only came into force in 1945, in France in 1944, in Belgium in 1948, in Luxembourg already in 1919 and in Germany in 1918. This non-homogeneous development in Europe can also be seen in the United States, where the general vote for women and minorities was only recognised in 1985, although it already existed in various states before that date. This success is due to many courageous women, who have often been supported by certain religious institutions and groups, such as the Quakers. Let us focus on such courageous women, such as Jane Addams, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony or Lucy Stone.

[Jane Addams](#) was a pioneer: as philosopher, sociologist, writer and social activist, [she](#) was engaged in causes such as women's suffrage and world peace. After a graduation from the Rockford Female Seminary, she studied medicine but left it because of poor health. During a tour to Europe with her friend Ellen G. Starr, she visited a settlement house and in 1889, together with Starr, she leased a large home built by Charles Hull, in Chicago. They moved in, and created the Hull-House, where the two young ladies raised money for the poor, took care of children and nursed the sick. By its second year of existence, Hull-House was host to two thousand people every week, and the Hull-House grew, as did also Jane Addams' reputation. As she gained notoriety, she was drawn into several civic responsibilities, and became, among others, the president of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. In December 1931, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

The Center for the History of Women Philosophers and Scientists tries to give a voice to all these intellectual women. During the summer semester, there are some lectures on women philosophers, for example, the lecture given by Ana Rodrigues on Mary Wollstonecraft, by [Felix Grewe](#) on Donna Haraway and by [Dr. Aaron Wells](#) on Mary Shepard.

Maria von Welser has moved the world with her reports on war. She has been to Chechnya twice for ZDF reports, she reported from Croatian refugee camps on mass rapes during the Bosnian war and worked as a reporter in the Gaza Strip and in India.

What we are experiencing today in Ukraine began in the 1990s, says the Russian writer Sergei Lebedev in an interview on Deutschlandfunk. Maria von Welser talked to us about her experiences as a war reporter in the Chechen war and the fate of the "women between the fronts".

The interview was a joint event of the German Academic Women's Association DAB e.V., the Center for the History of Women Philosophers and the International Association of Women Philosophers in Germany IAPH e.V.. After an interview of about 30 minutes, the participants of the Digital Lounge discussed with the speaker.
