Submissions should address relevant concepts emerging from the study of the history of women philosophers and scientists. The contributions may also address to present the ideas one idea or concept of an individual woman or group of women in any area of philosophy or to the philosophical foundations of sciences, such as mathematics, or to the philosophical and theoretical foundations of a physical or social science.

The focus lies on the contributions of women theorists who died prior to the 21st century.

WOMEN AND THEIR BODY: TALK SERIES AND CONFERENCE



Recent events have shown that it is urgent and fundamentally important to shed new light, through philosophical, linguistic, literary, scientific, medical and artistic perspectives, on the female body and the position of women in relation to their body. Too often it seems that women do not have the right to determine their own body, although men have never been deprived of this right. The question of power over the body is strongly linked to the distinction between men and women. It seems that men have more rights and power on their own body than women. But how is this possible? What is the status of the female body in culture and society? Why is the female body both, an object of desire and a battlefield for demonstrating male power? To what extent have medicine and technology interfered in recent years with the female body and with what consequences?

In the context of the New Voices Talk Series at the Center for the History of Women Philosophers and Scientists at Paderborn, we are inviting you to share with us your ideas about **Women and their Body.** We are inviting abstracts exploring any aspect of this urgent matter, covering categories like: Female Body in medicine (anatomy; childbirth, menstrual "tools" etc.); Female Body and Culture, Arts etc.; Body and Literature; Body Language; Body Experience; Body in Phenomenology; Female Body and Technology; Women on their body; Female Body as Battlefield; beauty mania; Female Body and Sports and even more.

New Voices on Women in the History of Philosophy is a group for emerging scholars who work on Women in the History of Philosophy organised in the winter term 2022/23 by Jil Muller. This term and subject intend to enlarge the network by making it more interdisciplinary, starting with a multidisciplinary Talk Series and Conference. Early scholars as well as established researchers are invited to send abstracts covering different fields in the humanities, speaking about **Women and their body**. New Voices is a place to connect and to foster communication on our work.

In the Talk Series from Winter 2022/23, there are at least **6 meetings/dates** (completely on Zoom) to be covered, but depending on the number of people interested in this subject, an international, hybrid conference is also planned



on **March**, **16**th **and 17**th **2023**. Report: Croatia Libori Summer School 2022

This year's Summer School, under the title WOMEN IN THE HISTORY OF PHILOSOPHY – CHALLENGING THE CANON was a product of collaboration of three institutions:

- Research Centre for Women in Philosophy at the Institute of Philosophy in Zagreb (Croatia)
- Centre for History of Women Philosophers and Scientist at the University of Paderborn (Germany)
- University of Zadar (Croatia)

The Summer School continues the tradition of the <u>Libori Summer School</u> which started in Paderborn in <u>2017</u> and lasted till the outbreak of the COVID pandemics. Institute of Philosophy organized an online-only summer school in 2021. This year, for the first time after 2019, with the support of University of Zadar, we will gather inperson in the beautiful city of Zadar again.

The Research Centre for Women in Philosophy at the Institute of Philosophy in Croatia and the Center for the History of Women Philosophers and Scientist at Paderborn University in Germany are devoted to promoting research and studies of women in the history of philosophy. This special philosophical endeavour beyond the mainstream is pursued to fill gaps in the history of philosophy. Can we repair the damage done to philosophy which, by excluded practically all women from its history, put in question its credibility and identity? Can we fully understand Socrates without Diotima, Plato without Aspasia, Descartes without Teresa of Ávila, Kant without Émilie Du Châtelet? How do we integrate women philosophers in the philosophical canon? This year's Croatia Libori Summer School aims to find answers to these questions along with the international research network which includes renown researchers and philosophers from Germany, the USA, Ukraine, Spain, and Croatia.

Encyclopedia of Concise Concepts - DO YOU WANT TO CONTRIBUTE?

The Encyclopedia of Concise Concepts by Women Philosophers is an online open-access platform where precise concepts originating in or significantly advanced by a deceased woman philosopher are given in concisely analytical entries (usually in no more than 300 words), written by recognized experts. The entries pass a blind peer-review in order to be published in the Encyclopedia. Each article will be continuously updated with links to the sources cited by scholars. Those articles, books, etc. will be digitally archived by Paderborn University so that they will not expire or break.

The Encyclopedia is fully indexed and searchable by keyword and by unique Digital Object Identifier (DOI) obtained by Paderborn University so that each entry counts as a refereed publication for the purposes of authors seeking promotion, tenure, academic appointment or funding.
